There is an interesting satellite image that shows a plume of sediment from the Maumee River extending all the way to Sandusky Bay dated May 8, 2017. Thankfully the prediction is lower than what we experienced in 2015.

Also in this edition of *I-LYA News*, is a follow up letter from US Sailing regarding proposed legislation in Maryland and Florida. This reminds us that we need to be vigilant when it comes to well-meaning lawmakers

and non-boating individuals trying to regulate boating operations. The article mentions input from many organizations, which include the National Boating Federation, to which I-LYA sends a delegate. Though we applaud the outcome, the letter notes that legislators will be proposing "alternatives" to their bills in the 2018 sessions.

Dear Government Relations and RSA Committee members,

Hope you are well and preparing for another excellent summer of sailing! Reaching out today with a brief update on our government relations activities on behalf of US Sailing. Specifically, the work we have been doing to protect sailors in the states of Maryland and Florida.

As many of you know, in late March, I had the opportunity to testify on behalf of US Sailing in opposition of *Maryland Senate Bill 1147-State Boat Act*. This bill would have prevented sailors from hiking, sitting on the rail, changing sails on the bow, etc. As a result of our testimony, coupled with the tremendous outreach from US Sailing's membership, SB 1147 stalled in the Maryland Education, Health, and Environmental Affairs Committee. When the Maryland General Assembly session ended on April 10, the legislation was nullified.

Similarly, in Florida, legislation that would have required boaters to have an adult chaperone on board until 16 years of age has been tabled. Due to our efforts, combined with overwhelming public support in opposition of *Florida Senate Bill 1242-Salt Water Boat Act*, the bill will expire tomorrow when the 2017 Florida legislation session adjourns for the season.

We understand that Maryland Senator James Mathias and Florida Senator Gary Farmer's offices will both be pursuing alternatives to their respective bills for the 2018 legislative session. The US Sailing's Government Relations Committee will continue to actively engage with both Senator's offices and plan to offer legislative input this summer that protects and serves the interest of the US Sailing membership. We will keep you updated on our progress in these states, as well as, any new developments on boating legislation that might impact sailors nationwide.

Boaters sound the alarm on E15 today - Norm Schultz Blog

Boaters need to take time today to let U.S. Senators know that adding more ethanol (E15) to America's gas supply is insupportable for the 12 million boats and millions of other off-road engines in use today.

What's triggered the need for this aggressive move right now? Bluntly, it's to head off a backroom deal by pro-corn Senators that would overturn methane emissions regulations in exchange for the ability to push more E15 into our gas pumps nationwide. We know there is no doubt E15 is destructive to our boat engines. We also must recognize that an estimated 97 percent of boat owners fill up at gas stations, not at gas docks offering ethanol-free fuel. And, we know more E15 in the marketplace will lead to (1) more misfueling and (2) the production and availability of ethanol-free gas will be greatly reduced or could disappear altogether.

TWO ACTIONS TODAY, PLEASE...1. Click on this link: <u>tell Congress or go to this site: (https://www.votervoice.net/NMMA/</u> <u>Campaigns/52152/Respond</u>) and let your Senators know that the nation's 12 million boating families, and the industry, cannot stand for more E15 and want the <u>broken</u> Renewable Fuels Standard (RFS) fixed now. 2. Ask your clubs and boating friends to "take 5" today and do the same: <u>tell Congress</u> **ARE WE RIGHT**?

Damage to millions of small engines notwithstanding, are we right in calling on Congress to take action on a broken RFS? Absolutely. When the RFS was created in 2007, there were several assumptions that have proven dead wrong.

First, a report published in 1999 by the Clinton administration entitled "Biofuels: A Solution to Climate Change" was cited as a major reason for the RFS. But it was wrong. Scientists know now that machines running on ethanol emit vast amounts of acetaldehyde that reacts with sunlight to form ozone. End product - smog. It will nearly double greenhouse emissions. Second, it was claimed the RFS would make America less dependent on foreign oil. We are less dependent today. But ethanol is not the reason. More fuel efficient cars use less gas and fracking and increased domestic oil production are making us far less dependent.

Bottom line: The demand by Congress 10 years ago to put ethanol in gasoline, while well intentioned, created a huge new industry and profit center for corn ethanol producers. And they are anxious to cash in more. If increased ethanol in gas is allowed to expand beyond its current level, it will be on the backs of boaters and millions of small engine owners. With no environmental benefit, and no national security benefit, it's a no brainer that Congress must act to revise the RFS.

Monroe Boat Club Hosts Clean Marina Seminar

Major stake-holders in the Bolles Harbor Waterway in SE Michigan attended a seminar hosted by Monroe Boat Club on Thursday May 4th to discuss the Michigan Clean Marina Program.

Ms. Liz Szlaga, Michigan Boating Industries Association Administrator and Mr. Brian Kelley, Michigan Clean Marina Specialist and Consultant addressed marina operators from Trout's Yacht Basin, OPM Club, Monroe Boat Club, Detroit Beach Boat Club and the Inter-Lake Yachting Association during an hour long presentation.



The Michigan Clean Marina Program is a cooperative effort of the Michigan Boating Industries Association, the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality and Michigan Sea Grant College Program (Michigan State University and the University of Michigan). The program promotes environmentally sound marina and boating practices to reduce pollution, enhance fish and wildlife habitat and protect Great Lakes water quality. It is open to all public and private marinas in Michigan.

Recognizing that a sound environment is critical to their businesses, those in attendance will investigate ways to maintain and improve their boating experience by reducing or eliminating releases of harmful substances and phasing out practices that can damage aquatic environments. These marinas are home to over 700 local boating families who dock,



launch, store and maintain recreational boats in the area; reducing pollution and protecting wildlife habitats is a benefit to everyone in the community.

While several I-LYA clubs participate in the Ohio Clean Marina program, there is not a single Michigan Clean Marina boat or yacht club in Lake Erie. Participating in the Michigan Clean Water Program includes training, an operations evaluation checklist and a site visit. Certified marinas strive for continuous improvement in daily environmental stewardship practices.

North Cape Yacht Club is pleased to announce its schedule for this summer's Adult Learn to Sail Program. This program, first initiated by I-LYA trustee and AYC delegate, Bill Pribe, seven years ago, is open to adults 18 years or older wishing to learn the basics of sailing.

Thus far 105 students have taken the ALTS classes since the program's inception in 2010. Each session consists of four evening class periods. Participants are briefly prepped ashore for the evening's lesson, and then the majority of the lesson takes place on the water. Participants learn sailing theory, terminology, boat handling, vessel rigging, safety procedures and more. Boats in the 26' range are used for the class, and there is one boat with two instructors for every 3-4 students, which allows for plenty of hands-on experience.

One of our 2015 participants remarked: "Fabulous experience! I loved it all and will be back for next session. The instructors are super great, informative and enthusiastic!" An ALTS student from 2016 added: "Everyone is passion-ate and friendly about sailing."

The dates for this year's sessions are: Session 1 June 13, 15, 20, 22; Session 2 July 11, 13, 18, 20

Session 3 August 1, 3, 8, 10

LOCAL SAILOR SHINES



After a year of travel in 2016, sailing with both LOOT and Fort Lauderdale Yacht Club, Sara Schumann from Cowan Lake Sailing Club represented the USODA in Palamos, Spain in February of 2017.

Sara Schumann is 13 years old and a member of the United States Development Team (USDT). Her home club is the Cowan Lake Sailing Association in Wilmington, Ohio. In the winter, she sails with the Fort Lauderdale Yacht Club and in the summer travels with the Lake Ontario Optimist Team (LOOT). Below are a few highlights from her 2016-2017 sailing accomplishments.

Sara qualified to represent the US in the XXXI Trofeo Marco Rizotti Regatta held in Venice, Italy in May after winning the US Midwinter Team Race Championships in Gulf Port, Mississippi sailing with the Fort Lauderdale Yacht Club. Interestingly, Sara was also invited to represent Canada at the event as well since she won the Canadian Team Race National Championships with three Canadian female skippers at Canadian Nationals in Toronto. She also finished 4th at Canadian Nationals overall in fleet racing and was the 2nd overall female skipper.

Life jackets save lives, but not enough Ohio boaters wear them. The Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR), Division of Parks and Watercraft set out to create an impactful message featuring real Ohio water adventurers and influencers. The new #WearItLiveItOhio campaign will be launched on several ODNR social media channels this summer.

The truth is, most folks don't like to wear life jackets. Research shows that most Ohio boaters and recreational water adventurers choose not to wear life jackets. Ohio law doesn't require it (except for children under 10 on boats less than 18 feet in length and on personal watercraft, such as Jet Skis), so why bother? And, as we so often hear, they're hot and uncomfortable.

The new campaign aims to strike closest to home, within the boater's inner circle of family and friends – those who carry the most influence. The basic social media messaging campaign emphasizes the reality that life jackets aren't optional. In precampaign focus groups, the campaign featuring photography of Ohioans on Ohio's waterways seems to resonate well with the intended audience.

In addition to promoted Facebook posts and other digital advertising throughout the boating season, we'll also be hosting some Facebook-only contests over the July 4 and Labor Day weekends. 2016 Chubb National Summary.. By Ryan Squires

I was able to make some of my best sailing memories during a successful 2016 sailing season. This was a culmination of hard work on my part and support from my parents, Hoover Sailing Club, I-LYA, and the Yachtsmen's Fund.

The 2016 U.S. Sailing Area E qualifier was a great regatta hosted by North Cape Yacht Club. Everybody loves their beach, friendly club and experienced race committee. A clinic before the regatta helped improve my sailing with some very high-end coaches. For younger sailors, I cannot emphasize enough how important good coaching

is. The more you can expose yourself to really good sailors and their advice, in addition to tiller time, the more you will improve. The Area E qualifier itself had some stiff competition, which made for a very exciting couple of days. I sailed the single-hand in a Laser Radial and was honored to take first and represent the I -LYA at the U.S. Sailing Chubb Junior Championships held at the beautiful Mission Bay Yacht Club in San Diego, California.

2016 brought the second time I sailed Chubbs. While I had a pretty good idea of what to expect, the best of the best were at this competition. With only 20 sailors, the competitors were very close in experience and ability and the tensions were high as everyone was fighting for a top national ranking. Ocean sailing through kelp beds is completely different than sailing in the Midwest! Although everyone took the racing very seriously, on shore everyone was very friendly and we were collaborating racing strategies. In the end, I ranked 12th but was very pleased with some top races that I will forever remember. For anyone who really wants to advance their sailing, I would definitely recommend trying to qualify for Chubb Junior Champs. At Chubbs, they sail single-hand (generally in a Laser or Bite), double hand (usually in a C420) and triple-hand (in various local boats, depending on where the event is). Chubbs was an extremely fun regatta and I learned more there than at any other event I have ever sailed.

I want to encourage all I-LYA junior sailors to look beyond our local regattas and make a goal of sailing at regional regattas and qualifiers. Those "big fleet" events test your talents in different ways, expose you to other better racers and push you to do better. U.S. Sailing Junior Olympic regattas can expose you to

great coaches, and sometimes, bigger fleets. Go to the U.S. Sailing website to check out where there are Junior Olympic regattas. Who knows, besides the one in Mentor in June, there might be one in New York or Michigan near where your family vacation is planned. The travelling and new venues itself can be really fun, but you have to plan ahead with your parents and Club to make it happen. Also, look where your fleet is hosting regional events like Great Lakes regattas. For the Opti, Great Lakes is at Grosse Pointe Yacht Club nearby in Michigan in the end of June. Go to the United States Optimist Dinghy Association (USODA) website for more information. The Thistle Great Lakes is at Edgewater Yacht Club that same weekend, go to the Thistle Class website for that one.

Clinics are another great way to expose yourself to great coaching. The C420 class has Midwest and East Coast clinics that you have to apply for, and I know Ian Moran really liked the C420 clinic he did in Chicago. Hoover is hosting an Optimist Race Clinic at the beginning of the season featuring instruction by my sister Grace Squires, winner of the 2016 Traveler Series Opti Fleet. There, kids will learn how to race rig an Opti, roll tack properly and practice starts over the course of one week. See the Hoover Sailing Club website for more information on that. If you can't make it to a clinic, ask the best Opti, C420 or Thistle sailors at your club to spend some time with you on the water. They have worked hard to be good and it is not surprising that they love to talk about it.

Of course, I could not have had a great 2016 season culminating at Chubbs, without the help and support of my family. Working during school breaks for sail funding is important. Even more important is giving back to your local clubs by teaching sailing and coaching. Sailing is an expensive sport, but with the help of the I-LYA Yachtsmen's Fund I was able to sail on a national level and better my racing skills in ways I will always appreciate.

The two-year FSSA membership req for Chartering has been waived for this event. A junior and immediate family, including grandparents, will agree in writing to abide by the Class Rules on Chartering; Article B-VIII.9 of the Bylaws - "Charterers shall be responsible for all damages to the boat and rigging, and shall pay the boat owner for repairs or replacement. They will not be responsible for breakage of running or standing rigging except in cases of collision. In the event of a dispute, the Protest Committee (during the event), or the National Championships Committee (in the event the Protest Committee has been disbanded), shall be the sole and final judge of responsibility. Charterers shall not drill holes in the boat or do anything else that may be construed as defacing, without permission of the boat owner. A boat shall be returned to its owner in exactly the same (or better) condition and arrangement as it was received. This includes unrigging and placing on its trailer."
