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## RACING RULES FOR SAIL YACHTS

Certificate of measurement must be filed with entry. The Sail Yacht Regatta Committee reserves the right to order any yacht entered re-measured.
Races for all classes, starting five minutes apart on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday mornings; starting first class at $8: 55 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.
All races under Y. R. U. and I. L. Y. A. Rules, as amended to date.
In Class C. K. championship flag goes to skipper making highest percentage, cup to club having highest percentage with three boats.
Entires for all races must be made with Sail Yacht Regatta Committee at headquarters for 6 p. m., Monday July 14th, unless competing yacht arrives too late to enter before this time.
Alterations of the race program or sailing course may be made at the discretion of the Sail Yacht Regatta Committee. Such changes will be posted on Bulletin Board.
Numbers must be carried by each yacht on each side of its mainsail. These numbers will be supplied by the Sail Yacht Regatta Committee at Headquarters.
No person other than the Judges, Regatta Committee and Clerks will be allowed on Judges' boat without the consent of the Chairman of the Sail Yacht Regatta Committee.
All stakes to be left to port unless changed by Regatta Committee. If the Regatta Committee decides to reserve the course and have stakes left to starboard, a green flag will be flown from judges' boat. Red flag will mean all stakes to port. The judges' boat will fly a white flag with blue letters R. C.
Guns must not be fired from any yacht within one hour of the time of starting races, and not until after every yacht has crossed the finish line.
All vessels following the races must keep to leeward, and at such distance as not to interfere with the maneuvers of the competing yachts.
The races are open to every yacht which complies with the rules and which is regularly enrolled in any club in the Inter-Lake Yachting Association, Y. R. U., or which has been invited to participate in the races.
All boats sailing the long side course will have four hours' time limit.
All boats sailing the short inside course will have three hours' time limit.

## SAILING COURSES

The course for all series races for sailing yachts in Universal Class, Classes R, and Y will be triangular, starting from a line between a flag buoy off the east end of Gibraltar Island and a similar flag buay in line with the west end of Middle Bass, to and around a stake three nautical miles N. N. W., thence to and around a stake three nautical miles S. W. three-quarters S., thence to and around a stake three nautical miles E. one-half $S$. to and across starting line between starting stakes. In finishing yachts must cross the starting line in the opposite direction from which they start. All stakes must be left to port, unless otherwise ordered by the Sail Yacht Regatta Committee as heretofore provided.

## RACING RULES FOR SAIL YACHTS

(Continued)
The course for Classes Star, K, CC, CK, and D, starting from the same line, will be a shorter triangle with the same compass courses, but with one and one-half miles to the side, or a total of four and one-half nautical miles.

## RULES COVERING CLASS " $Y$ " (CRUISING YAWLS)

All yachts in this class will be governed by the Y. R. U. rules, and will obtain their measurement rating under the Y. R. U. rules, with following exceptions:
Use of pot lead or similar compounds prohibited.
Measurement shall be determined with full cruising equipment aboard, and all such equipment shall be carried aboard throughout all races (not including dinghy).
Two per cent will be added to actual sailing time of yachts without engine as allowance to yachts with engine.
Yachts equipped with engine shall have engine sealed, if required by Committee.
There will be no restrictions on the number of passengers carried in this class of races.
Class Star: Rules of the Star Class Yacht Racing Association to govern.

## TIME ALLOWANCE

Time allowance will be computed on yachts in Classes Universal and Yawl, under the formula and table of the Yacht Racing Union, 1930 Rules.

## WATCH BULLETIN BOARD

There will be a Bulletin Board at Headquarters where changes in program and special instructions will be posted throughout the week.
All yachts whose preparatory gun has not been fired must keep clear of starting line. Any yacht willfully violating this rule will be disqualified.

# POWER BOAT RACING RULES 

$\omega$ WCitiosumu

1. Entries for all Power Boat races must be filed at Inter-Lake Yachting Association headquarters before July 14, 1930, at 6:00 p. M.
2. All boats in Classes A, E, F, G and H shall be measured by an accredited measurer of the A. P. B. A., their home club measurer, or the Inter-Lake Yachting Association power boat measurer. Boats not measured before their arrival at Put-InBay shall be reported at Interlake headquarters. The owner's name, boat's name, measuring fee, and anchorage shall be given to the secretary, so that the measurer can locate the boat readily.
3. Certificates of measurement must be filed with entries and the Regatta Committee reserves the right to remeasure at its option.
4. Races for each class shall consist of three heats.

First Heat. A. P. B. A. handicap racing rules. With penalty as provided in said rules.

Second Heat. Handicapped according to time of first heat. Any boat finishing ahead of actual elapsed time of first heat to be penalized double the amount of excess in figuring corrected time for the second heat.
Third Heat. Handicapped according to the best elapsed time of the two previous heats. Any boat finishing ahead of best elapsed time of two previous heats to be penalized double the amount of that time in figuring the corrected time for third heat.

The second and third heats will be a handicap race with the limit boat starting first.
5. All boats in a class in the first heat will start at the same time and handicaps allowed by allowing time against the corrected time.
6. Points for finish position will be awarded according to Rule XXIX of the A. P. B. A. as follows:

First boat to finish - - - - - - - . - . - - - 400 Points
Second boat to finish - - - - . - . - . . . . - 361 Points
Third boat to finish - - - - . - . - . - . - - 324 Points
Fourth boat to finish - - . . . . . . . . . . . - 289 Points
Fifth boat to finish - - - - . - . . . . . . - - 256 Points
Sixth boat to finish - - - - . - . - . . . - 225 Points
Seventh boat to finish - . . - . . . . . . . . . . . 196 Points
Eighth boat to finish - - - - - . - - . - . - - 189 Points
Ninth boat to finish - - - - - . - . - - - - - 144 Points
Tenth boat to finish - - - . - . . . . . . . . - - 121 Points
Eleventh boat to finish - - - . . . . . . . . . . - 100 Points
Twelfth boat to finish - - - - . . . - - - - . - 81 Points
7. The boat making the most points in the three scheduled heats will be declared the winner unless, of course, it has been disqualified for infraction of rules.
8. Starting times for all handicapped boats will be posted at headquarters before the race.
9. In general the racing rules of the A. P. B. A. will hold.
10. Summary: These rules have been drawn up, and their sole intent is to minimize as much as possible all differences in boat speeds, and to make seamanship and consistent performance the deciding factors.

The course is a straightway of $1 / 2$ mile, 6 times around or 6 miles.
The boat making the most points in the three scheduled races for the class shall be declared the winner. Points to be awarded according to 1928 rules.

## OUTBOARD EVENTS

Motors are divided into classes as follows: B-Including 14 cu . in. and under 20 cu . in. C-Including 20 cu . in. and under 30 cu . in. Free-for-All-Any size motor.
Rules of boat and engine manufacturers as adopted for 1928 to be used. All motors must be stock models.
Boats and engine must be inspected and tagged before the start of each day's races.

# $\Delta \Delta \Delta$ A Brief History <br> of the 

## INTERLAKE YACHTING ASSOCIATION


$\mathcal{T}_{\text {His year marks the thirty-seventh annual regatta of the I. L. Y. A. Actually, the }}$ first inter-lake regatta was held 54 years ago, in 1876. The organization then was called the International Yacht Association.
In 1885 the name was changed to the Inter-Lake Yachting Association. A few regattas were held and, inexplicably, the annual idea was dropped.
Came 1894 and Commodore George W. Gardner, the father of the present I. L. Y. A. and its first commodore. The fleets were back at the Bay again that year.
They have been there every year since, for 37 years, and are going back again.
The most memorable regattas ever held by the I. L. Y. A. were those of 1896 and 1913.

That in 1896 was outstanding because the Canadian fleet from Lake Ontario came down to the Bay, and after a week's sport, crossed to Toledo with the American yachts and raced for what was then known as the Canada Cup and is now called the Richardson Trophy.
The regatta of 1913 stands out as marking the Perry Centennial and the dedication of the Perry Monument at the Bay, and all the craft from all ports of the Great Lakes were there.

Some of the I. L. Y. A.'s greatest commodores, besides Commodore Gardner, were Commodore S. O. Richardson of Toledo, Commodore George H. Worthington of Cleveland, and Commodore William R. Harrington of Elyria, O. Each held the office several times.
Thirty-four yacht clubs located from Port Huron, Michigan, to Buffalo, N. Y., are members of the I. L. Y. A. and all very active.
This year a memorial is being erected and dedicated on July 14th to the honor of past Commodores and is located in the Park facing Gibraltar Island.
A Yachtsmen Fund of substantial amount has been accumulating each year, the income of which helps to perpetuate the existence of the I. L. Y. A.
Our Commodore for 1930 is Commodore E. E. Noble who is also Commodore of the Cleveland Yachting Club at the present time.
